Claremont Showground – A staple of Claremont's history

For more than 120 years, Claremont Showground has served as Western Australia's premier agricultural event precinct. Spanning more than 32 hectares, the ground was gifted to the Royal Agricultural Society of WA in 1902 by the State Government to replace older showgrounds in Guildford.

The showground has hosted a range of events since then, such as music festivals and concerts, markets, expos, AFL games, speedway racing, military purposes, and the most notable, the Perth Royal Show.

Managed by the Royal Agricultural Society, the showground hosts a mixture of both indoor and outdoor spaces, perfect for any type of event no matter the weather.

A 10-minute walk, or less than 5-minute drive, from the Showground lies the Claremont Town Centre.

"Visitors to Claremont Showground events are spoilt for choice when it comes to dining before or after an event. In the Claremont Town Centre, people can enjoy authentic Vietnamese cuisine at *Huong Viet Noodle House*, the bold Thai flavours of *Chilli Jam*, and the wide range of cafés, bars and restaurants located throughout Claremont Quarter," Cr Ryan Fernandes said.

"The variety of hospitality venues across Claremont helps create a vibrant experience for visitors while supporting our local businesses and contributing to the local economy," he added.

Have a go with the Claremont-Nedlands Cricket Club

Since its founding in 1896, the Claremont-Nedlands Cricket Club (CNCC) has competed under various identities from Claremont to Claremont-Cottesloe to now Claremont-Nedlands.

Despite these name changes, one thing that hasn't changed is the club's nature of welcoming players of all ages, abilities and backgrounds, providing opportunities for boys and girls to enjoy the game. From Cricket Blast for children aged as young as four to senior level programs, there's something for everyone.

The club is situated at Cresswell Park in Swanbourne on the westside of the Lake Claremont precinct.

The clubhouse is named after the McKenzie family that included one of Australia's greatest fast bowlers Graham McKenzie, along with his father Eric and uncle Doug who captained the first-grade team for 19 years. The clubhouse was redeveloped by the Town in 2021, with assistance from the cricket and hockey clubs.

Beginning in 2018, the club prides itself on its All Abilities program which is available to children and adults of any age with varying disabilities and special needs or those not yet comfortable joining a mainstream team or program.

"At Claremont-Nedlands Cricket Club, cricket is truly a game for everyone," All Abilities Coordinator Steve Drake-Brockman said.

"The All Abilities program reflects the values that have underpinned Claremont-Nedlands Cricket Club for more than a century: community opportunity and inclusion.

"It is one of the club's most rewarding initiatives, demonstrating that cricket's power extends well beyond competition by creating meaningful connections and

ensuring everyone has a place in the Tigers family," he added.

Looking ahead, a key priority for the club is growing girls and women's cricket. Head of Women & Girls Cricket at CNCC Tim Gregory said that with female participation growing rapidly nationwide, the club will offer free girls' cricket taster sessions throughout the season, giving girls a fun, welcoming place to try cricket, develop skills and make friends.

Last season the club had over 600 participants in all cricket programs from Senior to Blasters entry level cricket catering to the youth of the Claremont area.

The club is now 130 years old and since inception CNCC is proud to have produced many State and Test players such as Graham McKenzie, Laurie Mayne, Ross Edwards, Craig Serjeant and Ian Brayshaw and now current T20 Australian player Tim David.

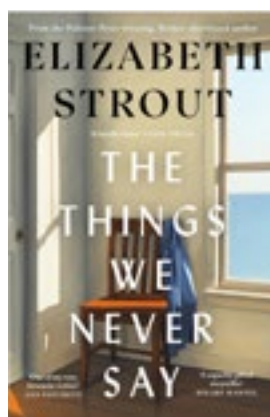
Spring reads

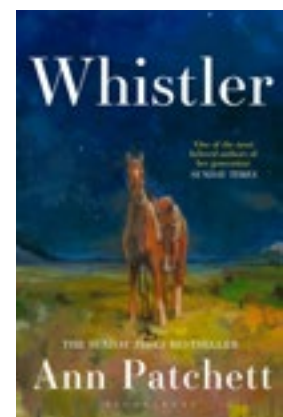

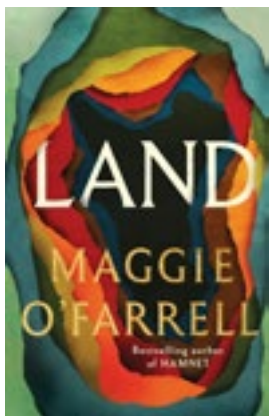

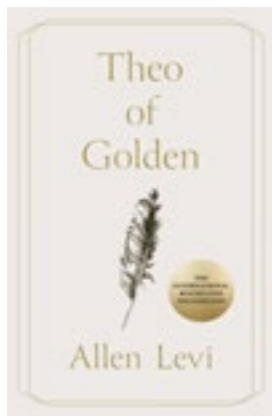

Caring for our street trees

At the Town, sustaining and enhancing our leafy streets is a critical step towards supporting a greener and cleaner environment.

As such, there are best practices to follow when it comes to caring for and pruning trees.

In compliance the Australian Standards, Pruning of Amenity Trees (AS 4373-2007), trees are pruned annually to provide safe access for vehicles, pedestrians and cyclists. While the Town encourages trees to grow as close to their natural form as possible, they will only be pruned for safety reasons, to improve the tree's health, to improve vision and access for vehicles and pedestrians, and for Western Power and Main Roads requirements.

The Town won't prune or remove trees to enhance or clear views, if the species is disliked, for aesthetic purposes, or to thin the canopy or to prevent leaf or flower drop.

Infringements may apply if any trees are pruned, removed, poisoned or vandalised without authorisation. If a large or significant tree needs to be removed from a private property, please call the Town first.

"The Town is extremely proud of its tree canopy and any measures taken to preserve our trees are always welcome," Cr Paul Kelly said.

"We want to ensure our trees remain an integral part of Claremont's scenery for many years to come," he added.

Town-wide uplift pruning

The Town's tree contractors are due to start the Town-wide canopy uplift program in September 2026.

Work will begin in the eastern ward, followed by the western ward then finish in the southern ward with work expected to take up to six months to complete.

Main Roads standard minimum clearance heights for trees are 2.4 metres over footpaths and verges, and 4.5 metres over roads to allow safe usage by both vehicles and pedestrians.

Please take note of when contractors are in your area and refrain from parking on the street during this time so arborist machinery can be used safely, and adequate access can be provided.

Mulder Park revegetation

Recently, the Parks Team planted a mixture of grasses, shrubs and flowers at Mulder Park to replace the fig trees which were removed due to the Polyphagous shot-hole borer.

Attendees can expect a variety of water-themed interactive activities such as the ever popular swan boats, sing sea shanties with A Pocketful of O'Quays,

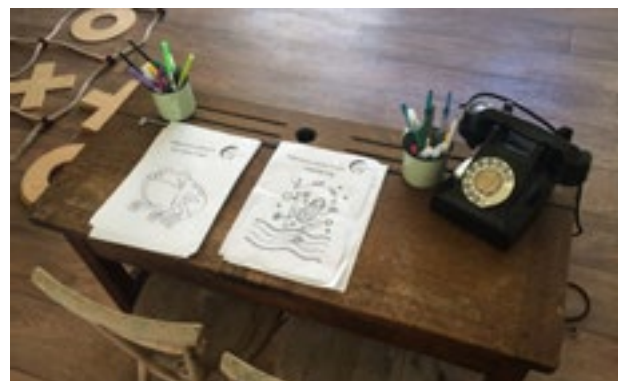

The Claremont Museum – tales and treasures

Step back in time and explore Claremont's history, from hidden treasures to the iconic Boat Shed, the Claremont Museum offers an immersive experience for all.

Constructed in 1862, the Claremont Museum was originally the historic Freshwater Bay School with the building having been used for many purposes, from a boarding house to a police station, with the Museum opening in 1975.

The Boat Shed offers an absorbing representation of 1900's boating on the Swan River. With approximately 700 artefacts and connections to the Broome Pearling Industry, this collection is one of a kind.

The Museum hosts Boat Shed Tours, and as these tours are in high demand, it is recommended that interested parties stay up to date by visiting the Town's website.

Events at the Museum are targeted towards all ages, including kids. The Sunday Funday program allows kids to participate in fun and educational activities.

Adults can enjoy learning something new at History in a Coffee Cup or wander through Claremont at Claremont Meanders.

"The Town is proud to have the Museum available, offering unique and engaging experiences to residents and visitors alike," Cr Jill Goetze said.

"With programs for kids and adults, there's something for everyone to enjoy at the Museum," she added.
